The Industry Training and Apprenticeships Amendment Bill



Yes it's starting again! Apparently a new apprenticeship scheme will be in place by January next year.

It will be called New Zealand Apprenticeships and will replace the Modern Apprentices and other apprenticeship-type training.

It seems the government has realised that during the 10 years to 2010, government funding for industry training organisations (ITOs) almost trebled, but wasn't matched with sufficient accountability.

The Government claims the new scheme will focus ITOs on

The Prime Minister should hang his head in shame as last week he addressed the United Nations and made some very profound statements. It would have been an excellent speech if the government was practicing what he preached. In our opinion the actions of his Minister of Building and Construction and the PGD Board, is the exact behaviour the Prime Minister criticised the UN for.

He talked about finding solutions, about discussions becoming so arcane they are sometimes quite removed from the issues they claim to be addressing. He spoke of the failure to find solutions and that the gap between aspiration and delivery is all too apparent and a means to hold those responsible to account.

Mr Key spoke of New Zealand having a robust and transparent system of government and of situations where as long the problem is left unresolved there can be no assured peace.

He reminded everyone that sound governance arrangements and

two core responsibilities: setting skill-standards for their industries, and arranging training.

It also clarifies the functions and powers of NZQA in relation to ITOs, and strengthens the quality assurance framework for ITOs ensuring it is consistent with the framework for other tertiary education organisations.

They seem to think the changes will boost system performance for employers and trainees, increase the profile and quality of apprenticeships, and build greater links between government, industry training organisations, and the industries they serve.

It may work if they listen to the industries over qualifications and get industries on board. If they don't it will be just a change in wrapping.

ED Yes we agree with you that a complaint should be made but who do we make it to?

We can't complain to the Board as

transparency of process were vital virtues. He went on that there has been **deep resistance to efforts to make things better** and that it needed to change and that the some have become **hostage to their own traditions** and **to the interests of the most powerful.**

He covered the subject that there now seems to be a practice whereby actions can be blocked through veto and there appears to be privileged access to information and action can be stopped if it does not suit their collective purposes. Such behaviours damage the reputation and credibility of the wider Organisation and must be challenged.

He spoke of New Zealand not advocating revolution but is asserting the Council can and **must do better in the way it conducts its business** and that is the approach New Zealand will bring to the Security Council if they are elected next October.

These two quotes were of particular interest:

- "At the top of that list was you have to be engaged, to listen to the concerns of others, and to have a view and a voice if you are to be relevant"
- "Sometimes, you have to speak up and shine a light on what is going on or not going on even when that may be inconvenient to others"

Sometimes, you have to speak up and shine a light on what is going on or not going on even when that may be inconvenient to others - and isn't that what the Federation been doing and we get referred to as malcontents and worse, and get treated like absolute garbage. The speech could have quite easily been referring to our situation and what the government should do about it, but haven't.

Look at the Government veto of the recommendations of the Regulations Review Committee (RRC) and the manner in which they have prevented the RRC from reporting on the latest complaints. Look at how the Government veto the recommendations of the Ombudsman and change the law so that which was unlawful becomes lawful.

It really does show the hypocritical way the Government, Minister of Building and Construction and Plumbers Gasfitters and Drainlayers Board operate. They talk it up on the world stage but in reality there is no substance to what they are doing within New Zealand. If the Government was to do the things in our industry that they say they will do in the UN then New Zealand would be a far better place for us to work.

The distance between the PGDB and its regulation of the industry is widening and is approaching a point of no return - to a place where voluntary compliance will never be achieved. A point where there is no advantage in participating in the regulated industry. A point where the public are put at risk due to lack of industry experience and what is the industry doing to create this situation — nothing at all, it is all a situation created by the Minister and the Board.

It is their actions and closed organisation feeding off the industry that is the problem. Have a look at what they have done this year to achieve their

Talking to the Minister is a total waste of breath as he will no doubt claim it is a "mistake in wording" and knows nothing of accountability.

The Ombudsman's recommendations are ignored so that really leaves us with the Office of the Auditor General.

They audited the financials back in June 2013 and gave an opinion they fairly reflect the Board's financial position and that they comply with generally accepted accounting practice so we think it is fair to say they won't criticise themselves.

The Federation has added the actions of the Board to its ever expanding list of issues for the Auditor General's review if it ever starts.

Your Fact or Fiction article shows a bleak picture where fewer and fewer trades people are paying for increases in costs in some areas.

I see expenditure on wages is increasing steadily. I haven't had a wage increase in years and my costs keep going up. Salaries look like they have more than doubled in less than eight years.

How can Williamson claim the Board are doing a good job?

ED A very good question. Well we believe he comes out with statements like that because he doesn't want to know what the truth is. It's like they say in the movies "he can't handle the truth."

We think he believes what he is being told because it is convenient and because he despises the Federation being right when his charitable purpose. More time is spent inventing ways to justify their existence and structure than anything else. They choose discipline as a means of control.

The annual report shows that 0.61% of authorised trade's people in the industry were the subject of complaints last financial year but yet 100% are deemed incompetent because they don't buy "POINTS" in the Board's continuing professional development scheme.

Perhaps the Board should be looking at the positive that there are no problems with 99.39% of the industry - but they don't. They employ four of five lawyers on staff and have one lawyer and a justice of the peace on the Board who appear to be used to protect the decisions and positions of the Board and senior management - even when wrong.

Look at the Minister re-appointing two Board members without giving anyone else the opportunity to effect change. Was that because they are doing such an excellent job? Or was it because the Minister was afraid no one would apply to go on a Board which is under fire for their performance? Perhaps no one wants to be associated with such a failure or perhaps the Minister can't take the risk of free thinkers getting on the Board challenging what they are doing and exposing their incompetence.

Some people tell us we are wasting our time and are not achieving anything but we need to look not only at what we are fighting against from an historical point of view but also what actions we are preventing. When you look at the blatant issues the Board has gone ahead with in its arrogant manner and imagine where we would be if the Federation hadn't been formed. Would the self proclaimed voice of the industry have stepped forward? We doubt it – it appears they have their own internal problems keeping them busy.

Prevention is better than cure so we will keep on fighting for what we believe is right. All those people supporting the Federation have a vision of a better industry where we can do what we do best without interference from outside influences.

You, the 1070 Federation members, have formed an organisation which I believe will achieve results with or without the help of other industry groups. Federation membership is the foundation of the future and we need more members so please help protect our industry by recruiting more members so our voice is louder with better balance and common sense than others attempting to get numbers for financial survival and position.
