

A word from the Chair

This is my final column. I will be retiring from the Board in January 2014, due to personal reasons. When I accepted the role of Chair, I set out "to restore the reputation of the Board as a fair and responsible regulator in the public interest".



s a lay member of the Board the protection of the public is of paramount importance.

The Act under which

we all operate, in my years of experience in the public sector, is unnecessarily complicated. This makes it very difficult for tradespeople, as well as the Board.

In my time as Chair, the current Board and its management have worked diligently to resolve the legacy issues we inherited. In my view, the end is in sight when the Auditor General's review is issued early next year. There have been many achievements in the last few years. CPD is now a way of life for licensed tradespeople. Work still needs to be done to ensure that courses are of high quality and accessible in all parts of the country. The technical difficulties with funding of disciplinary actions and prosecutions have been addressed by Parliament; where both the problem and solution lay. The Board's non-taxable status has been confirmed by the courts and is beneficial to all licensed persons.

While the Board has reduced its overall operating costs, it suffers from a lack of economies of scale. I have advocated for the amalgamation of the three trade occupational licensing boards. In my view, that is the best way to

reduce the costs of licensing to tradespeople.

From my observations the majority of tradespeople are competent, ethical and responsible - but there is a proportion of the industry who are not and bring it into disrepute. Regulation of trades is therefore essential in order to protect the public from the actions of this minority, which is key to the Board's purpose.

As I leave, I wish to acknowledge the hard work of my colleagues on the Board, Max Pedersen The Registrar along with his team, and thank them for that.

DO YOU HAVE THE REQUIRED NUMBER OF CPD POINTS TO RELICENSE?

s CPD is part of our industry licensing framework and a condition of renewing your licence each year, it's important to make sure you have enough points accumulated by 31 March 2014 - before the new licensing year begins. If you do not have enough points when you come to relicense, it is likely that a new licence will not be issued to you - so we want to keep his date at top of

mind. To check on how you are tacking with your CPD points balance, visit <u>www.</u> <u>pgdb.co.nz</u> log in to your profile and view your summary. Or, please feel free to contact our licensing team on 0800 743 262, they are happy to help out with current point balance details.

Sanitary plumbing, gasfitting and drainlaying are regulated industries in NZ and it's illegal for anyone to do this work unless they are authorised to do so by the Plumbers, Gasfitters and Drainlayers Board.

Who needs to be authorised?


EVERYONE DOING PLUMBING, GASFITTING AND DRAINLAYING WORK NEEDS TO BE AUTHORISED BY THE BOARD. THIS ALSO INCLUDES THOSE WORKING UNDER SUPERVISION.

We recently recieved some feedback that some tradespeople think that they don't need their own authorisation to carry out work, as long as they are supervised by an authorised person. This is not the case.

Any person who is actually doing plumbing, gasfitting or drainlaying needs to have their own authorisation. That applies whether they are registered, a trainee or a person working under an exemption under supervision. Any person who is actually doing plumbing, gasfitting or drainlaying needs to have their own authorisation. This applies whether you are

registered, a trainee or a person working under an exemption under supervision. The Board issues all authorised people with a card which identifies the type of work they are permitted to carry out.

Only certifying tradespeople are able to work without supervision. For everyone else, the authorisation card details what the person's supervision requirements are on the reverse, including the name of the supervisor. Work being undertaken by anyone who does not have Board authorisation is working unlawfully.

p until now there has been no formal process in place to measure public awareness of licensed tradespeople and the industry standards. The Board plans to launch a new public awareness measure in 2014, by taking part in one of Colmar Burnton's regular online surveys.

Undertaking an option such as this, is a very cost-effective way of interviewing a large number of New Zealanders throughout the country. Results from the first survey undertaken will be regarded as a 'baseline' from which subsequent survey results can be compared, and any improvements

measured. The results of the survey will help the Board gain a good understanding of public awareness and effectiveness of the current 'ask for the card' campaign. The findings from the survey will help with the future campaign strategy and boost future awareness.

Prosecutions

Noel Maker was convicted and fined \$750 along with solicitor's (\$113) and court costs (\$130), in the Kaikohe District Court, 24 September 2014.

Mr Maker pleaded quilty to one charge of carrying out work or employing a person to carry out sanitary and plumbing work when not authorised to do the work.



From 1 July 2013
gasfitting was classified into one of three formal risk based categories – low-risk, high-risk and general work. Calls to the Board office regarding associated gasfitting certificates have indicated that there is some confusion

MINISTRY OF BUSINESS, INNOVATION AND EMPLOYMENT

There have been changes to the Building Act.

The changes affect the work of building practitioners and the home handyman. They are in the Building Amendment Act 2013 that became law on 28 November 2013. Some changes come into force immediately and some will come into effect in 2014.

PRODUCTIVITY PARTNERSHIP

New Zealand is on the brink of the biggest construction boom in 40 years, according to a joint industry and government report recently released.

The National Construction Pipeline report points to an unprecedented level of building and construction in New Zealand over the next five years.

The report forecasts an increase in construction right across the country in both residential and non-residential sectors. Construction hot spots are Auckland, followed by Canterbury and then Waikato/Bay of Plenty and Wellington. The main drivers of growth are

Auckland's residential housing demand more than doubling (projected 150 percent increase) and the Canterbury rebuild.

"This is a heads-up to the sector," says Productivity Partnership spokesperson Andrew Reding. "We want people to be aware that there is an ongoing pipeline of work so they can manage resources appropriately".
