The Forgotten Industry



Has the Minister of Building and Construction forgotten he also has responsibilities for the Plumbing Gasfitting and Drainlaying Industry? You would have to think so when his so called "new Board" hasn't improved anything over the last three to four years and in fact the situation has got worse.

We know he's into his rainbows and we also know there is a pot of gold (for the government) at the end of the rainbow over the Plumbers Gasfitters and Drainlayers Board. We say a pot of gold for the Government because they appear to be the only people benefiting from the funding of the Board.

We believe that if the government was paying for the Board there would be better scrutiny over their performance rather than the industry being forgotten and left to wallow in the pitiful regulation imposed on it.

Everyone knows politicians use media releases to make themselves look better or to gloat about achievements. We had a look at Maurice Williamson's site on Parliaments website and noted he had 116 Media releases since this time last year. What was frightening was the number relating to plumbing, gasfitting and drainlaying. Two was the magic number – one about the reappointment of two board members and the other was about the Amendment Bill which we all know took away the rights of the industry. Surely this will go down in history as one of the most disgusting actions ever taken against the industry.

Two media releases. Does this mean that for the last 12 months the Board didn't do anything that was note worthy by the Minister? We checked the Board's media releases and they had six to do with prosecutions, four about licensing, one about awards and one about the Amendment Bill. What a Stella year.

The Board's failure is the Minister's failure and both parties should note the pot of gold gets smaller as people drop out of their regulation regime. reputation. The survey simply gauges how the Secretariat is performing what it gets paid to do and that is to provide high class administrative services.

It's like building a house where you can have the best tradespeople in the world building it but if the plans are crap them the end product is the same.

We have no doubt the Secretariat can work well in difficult situations (and so they bloody should given how expensive they are!), but they are restricted by what the actual Board gives them to work with.

If the Board wants a true satisfaction survey then they should split the survey between the Secretariat's performance and the appointed Board's performance.

For the appointed Board they should ask questions regarding the appointed Board's reputation, their communication with the industry, the policy decisions they are making, the decision making process, their consultation with the industry and such like.

It seems to us the Board are portraying the satisfaction survey as pertaining to the appointed Board's and the Secretariat's performance when

Maurice Williamson said this in a letter dated 12 September 2012:

"It is my belief that, with the appointment of a new Chairman and Chief Executive, the Board has made good progress in addressing the findings of the Auditor-Generals report, regarding the confidence of the sector, and reducing the

number of complaints about its activities. The Ministry of Business, Employment and Innovation will continue to work with the Board to ensure these activities continue"

Eighteen months down the track and this statement is still a load of dribble. There is only limited confidence from a small part of the sector and the reason there are fewer complaints is that people are totally sick of there being no action by the Minister and him simply coming out with statements such as *"Since I have nothing further to add on these matters, I respectfully propose we do not correspond further on them"*.

Not talking to the industry doesn't change anything; it only prolongs the eventual shut down to the regulation of the industry.

We believe the Minister of Building and Construction, Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment and the Plumbers Gasfitters and Drainlayers Board, for all their so called higher education and experience, must be incredibly stupid not to realise it is not about the regulation regime but the MANNER in which it is being imposed.

We believe they have reached rock bottom, and have started to dig. If the Minister was at all interested he would facilitate an emergency meeting of stakeholders to search for a way forward as what is being done now is just a total FAILURE! However it does need to be a meeting of action not a "fob off" meeting, as we have met with him before and no action was taken. Total waste of oxygen and time in our opinion.
