Pay no fees to the PGDB action

Thanks to everyone who supported the pay no fees to the PGDB campaign.

For some they have got their point across and have this week received letters from the Board and have relicensed.

The Boards letter was very blunt and lacked any customer service principles. It did not even outline the reasons why the applications for a fees and levy waver had been declined and flatly refused to look at the exemption applications until the fee had been paid.

This flies in the face of what the CEO stated in the Plumbers Journal

"When you're in a regulatory environment, it's easy to think you don't have customers, but you actually do because they are registered and licensed with the Board, plumbers, gasfitters and drainlayers are our customers and they deserve the type of service that any other customer in any other environment will get"

The annoying thing is there is already legislation in place for an industry representative Board and it's called the Plumbers Gasfitters and Drainlayers Act 2006 but it is interpreted to be the Plumbers Gasfitters and Drainlayers Consumers Enforcement Act 2006.

The Government has been duped and like the industry, has been blindly following people with set methodologies and ideologies.

Have a look around the industry and nearly every Board currently operating in our industry is struggling to get support for their line of thinking. Plumbers Merchants shareholders rejected suggestions by its Board – Master Plumbers members rejected suggestions by its Board – the Plumbers Gasfitters and Drainlayers Board are routinely rejected and other industry groups are influenced by similar if not the same people.

Although the Boards and the organisations are failing these people still seem to place their perspective and beliefs above others and are now in positions were they are firmly entrenched leaving the rest of the industry with no options that to show dissent.

Is it a co-incidence that several of these Board's use the same people? It's like a merry-go-round of ineptness.

Last year the Board reported an 8.4% decline in licensing and here they are nearly two months into the new licensing period and numbers are down again and protest actions still continue.

But anyway some of those who protested are continuing on, seeking information about the process that was followed by the Board and what was discussed and the reasons why.

- Certifying Plumbers down 16.78% (includes 63 new Registrations)
- Certifying Gasfitters down 12.37% (includes 25 new Registrations)
- Certifying Drainlayers down 21.35% (includes 11 new Registrations)
- Licensed Plumbers down 28.03% (includes 93 new Registrations)
- Licensed Gasfitters down 21.6% (includes 47 new Registrations)
- Licensed Drainlayers down 16.56% (includes 49 new Registrations)
