Another Privacy Breach



Unfortunately there has been another privacy breach which takes to four, the privacy issues from the Board in the last three years. Firstly, there was a disciplinary report sent to the wrong people where a

person's name was supposedly suppressed; secondly there was a dispute sent to the wrong person in Upper Hutt when it should have been sent to Nelson; thirdly there was the issue of the Board forcing gas fitters to release the names, contact details and telephone numbers of customers in order for a gas certificate to be issued. (This action was revoked once the Federation explained the error in their demands.)

The latest episode is the breach of privacy of over 60 people, whereby their identities were able to be read as part of the minutes of the Board meeting held in May 2014. The document which the Board posted on their website as part of their move to become open and transparent listed all the names of people who had applied for a waiver of fees and levies and applied for exemptions.

The Board had attempted to protect the privacy of individuals by way of blackening out the names, but when opening the document on a tablet it was found all the names could be read. The Board was notified of the issue on 10 July 2014.

On 11 July 2014 the Board sent a letter to the Federation. Part of it read:

"Upon receipt of your notification, the minutes were immediately removed from the website and a new, secure copy of them was made and placed back on the website at 10.50am yesterday."

This was correct, but the new copy did not include every second page so the Federation notified the Board and this problem was corrected. The letter went on to say:

"An investigation into this matter has been conducted and it has been revealed that the copy of the minutes originally placed on the website may have been able to be altered to reveal personal information that had been redacted. The Board will ensure that no future copies of its meeting minutes published on the website can be manipulated in this way."

We don't like what is being inferred in this paragraph such as "the

What is also highlighted with this situation is the fact that no complaint can be laid with the Board as their General Complaints Policy does not deal with — wait for it - general complaints! Is this going to be a short lived truce?

Who will be held accountable - the Federation or the Board's Secretariat? The resources available to the Board (at our cost) mean that this sort of thing should not happen.

Mitre 10 MEGA Upper Hutt



The initiative we announced last week in conjunction with Mitre 10 MEGA, Upper Hutt has had a positive response, except for a few who you would expect comment from.

The government by way of legislation, and the Plumbers Gasfitters and Drainlayers Board by way of regulations, have

squarely laid the liability for the actions of every New Zealander or person visiting or working temporarily in New Zealand or holidaying etc on the plumbing, gasfitting and drain laying industry. So this initiative is about mitigating practitioner's liability and protecting the unregistered from themselves.

The actions of doing plumbing, gasfitting or drainlaying while unregistered are out of our control, and yet we have to pay for the policing and prosecution of non registered people. This is one simple way of mitigating our liability. For every non registered person whom we stop - its one less person we have to pay for enforcement for, or pay for court action, and not only that, it is one less person that can get it wrong.

Are we going to be able to stop the sales to everyone – probably not but at least we can keep our costs down. Here are a few of the interesting emails sent to us this week.
